
#### **Excellent Ritual Continues In Our Valley**

## NEWS FROM YOUR CLEVELAND MASONIC LEARNING CENTER

The Cleveland Children's Dyslexia Center, formally known as the 32° Masonic Learning Centers for Children, was established in 1993. Since that time, with the guidance and generous support of the Masonic family, a network of Learning Centers has been established throughout the Northern District.

The Learning Centers provide individualized tutoring for children who struggle with reading because of dyslexia. The children enrolled at the Center are typically exceptionally bright and creative, but dyslexia often interferes with the acquisition of language and reading skills.

The specialized instruction provided at the Centers, at no charge to the families served, helps children to stop guessing at words as they learn to decode text. Lessons start at the

beginning with the alphabet and the corresponding sounds are learned. After the basic phonemes are mastered, simple syllables are introduced followed by increasingly more complex word patterns. Spelling rules are taught, as well as Greek and Latin morphology, which aides in vocabulary building.

During lessons concepts and skills are not just taught; they are practiced and reviewed until the child gain automaticity. Reading fluency with good reading comprehension is the goal. Children generally complete their tenure at the Learning Center within two years. Many children graduate the program with reading comprehension in the above average range, as measured with standardized testing.

Since the Cleveland Center opened its doors in 2000, hundreds of children have benefited from direct multisensory instruction. Reports of former students' successes include the following: Anthony, a premedical student at the University of Dayton; Dianne, majoring in chemistry at Cleveland State; Travis, a heating and cooling installation pro; Matthew, majoring in marine biology.

The young people who benefit from the Children's Dyslexia Center program will ultimately benefit their families and community. Thank you to all who have provided the gift of literacy. Your Learning Center is doing great work as behalf of the Valley of Cleveland. Thank you for your support of the Annual Walk, Souper Bowl Supper, and fundraisers throughout the year. Our Center is a success because of the generosity of the members of Valley of Cleveland and our Masonic Family!!!!



# Next Degree...... Bahurim Council of Princes of Jerusalem 15<sup>th</sup> Degree – Knight of the East Monday February 4, 2019 7:00 PM Robert C. Cygan 32°, Soverign Prince Presiding

In the year B.C. 586, by order of Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon, thousands of the more prominent Jews were deported from Palestine and settled in colonies in various parts of Babylonia. Cyrus the Great, who conquered Babylonia in B.C. 538 and founded the Persian Empire, issued a decree permitting the captive people to return to their homeland and to rebuild their shrines. Darius I continued this generous policy and gave substantial aid to the returning exiles. Both Cyrus and Darius were disciples of Zoroaster. They believed in one God, who demands righteousness from his worshippers. These religious beliefs, similar in many respects to the faith of the Jews, motivated their considerate attitude toward the captive people.

Inspired by such leaders as Zerubbabel, Ezra and Nehemiah, groups of Jews endured the hardships of the long journey, and joined with their loyal brethren in Jerusalem to rebuild the Holy City and the Temple of their God. The second Temple was completed and dedicated in B.C. 516.

In the Allegories of the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Degrees, we are taught, by the example of Zerubbabel, the important lessons of loyalty to conviction, fidelity to duty and devotion to Truth.
